How did God lead you to BJA?



What is a lesson God has been teaching you that you would like to share?




ROBOTICS TEAM MEETS CHECK WINNERS

If you consider the most ingenious and inventive men in the world, Elon Musk will likely rise to the top of your list. With a passion for creating a sustainable future, Musk launched the X Prize competition in April of 2021. The competition offered \$100 million to teams that demonstrated effective carbon removal and measurement technology.

Following the announcement, seven Bob Jones University students and several faculty members started developing the BJU entry. After a summer and partial semester of work, they submitted their proposal: a device to measure carbon storage in soil. In November of 2021, the team received an unbelievable notification: they had won \$100,000 from the world's richest man.
